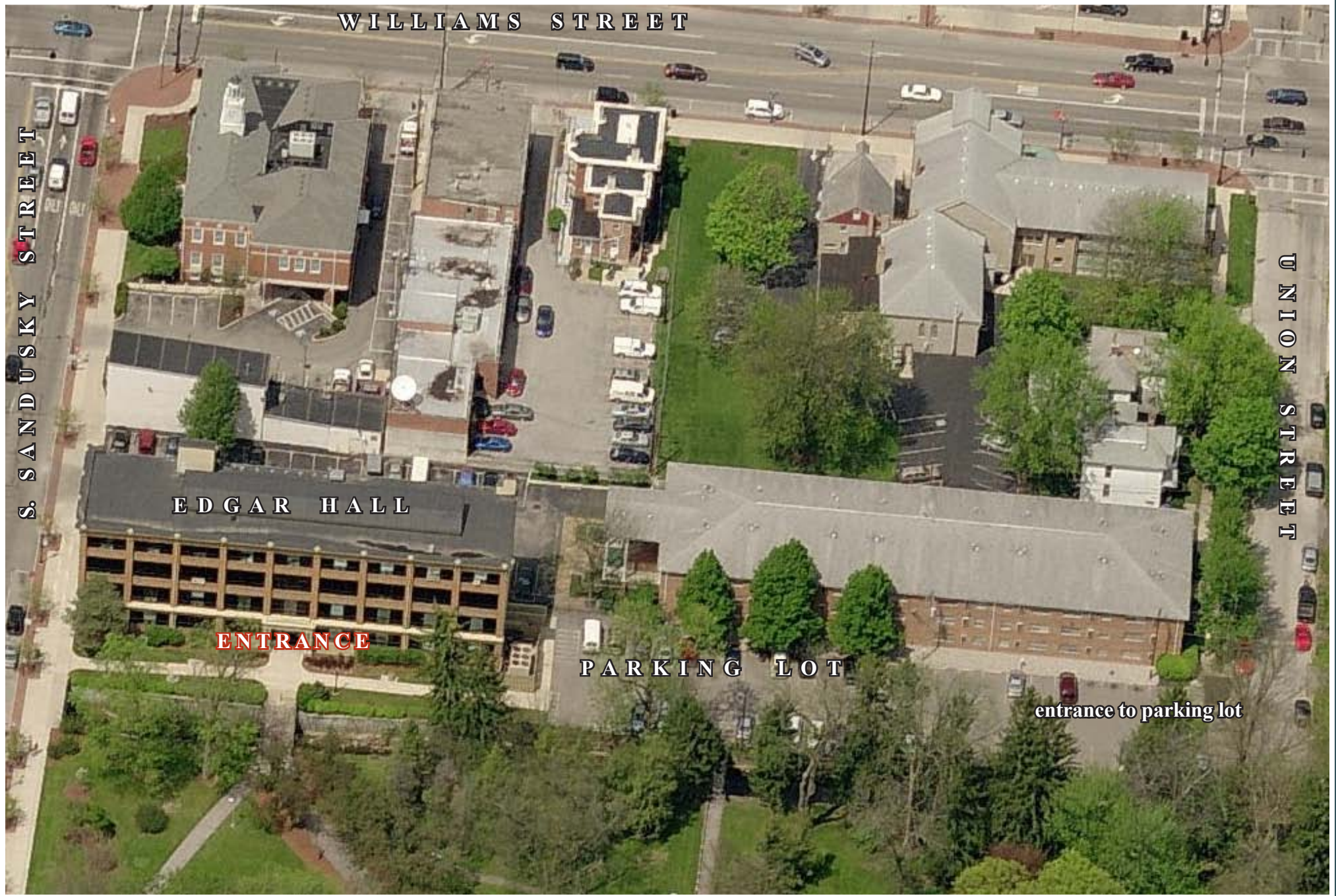

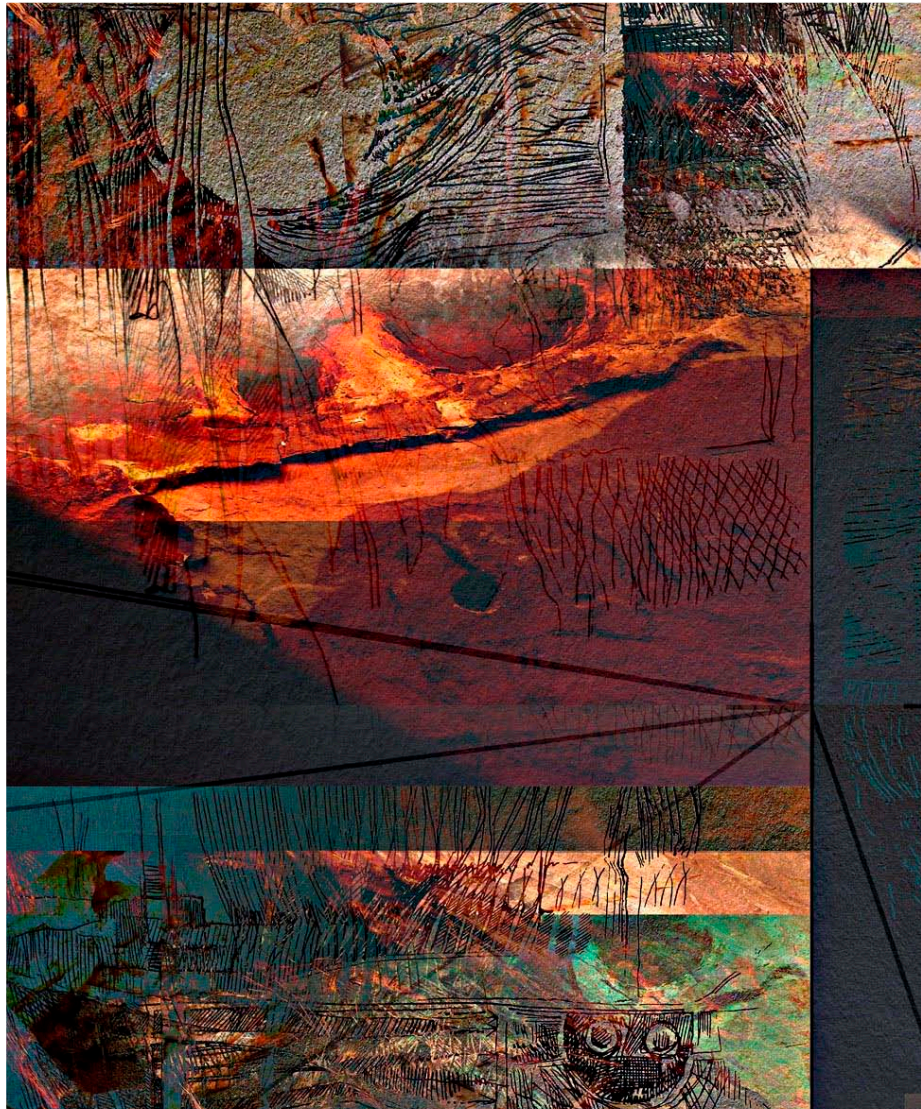

February speaker: James Kreihbel

James Kreihbel is chair and full professor of fine arts at Ohio Wesleyan University where he teaches digital design and printmaking. For the last 15 years, he has been studying Anasazi (ancestral Puebloan) Indians. The art that he created from his visits to these ancient sites led to research in archeoastronomy, which he has been working on for the last three years in southeast Utah. In his illustrated presentation, Kreihbel will talk about his research in archaeoastronomy and his art. In some cases the art work helps to unravel the anthropological and scientific mysteries of remote Ancestral Puebloan sites. Yet at other times his experiences in the canyons inform the creation of the art work.
